



Guiding Principles – Resources, Tools & Model Programs

Principle: Economic Vitality

Economic Development & Financing Corporation: EDFC is a non-profit, tax-exempt Community Development Financial Institution (CDFI) founded in 1995 that engages in economic development activity in Mendocino and Lake Counties. EDFC obtained official certification as a CDFI in September 2013. EDFC focuses on providing gap financing and acting as a lender-of-last-resort for small business, incubating economic development projects, and coordinating economic development activity for Mendocino County.

Rural Business Enterprise Grants (RBEG) Program. A program that provides grants for rural projects that finance and facilitate development of small and emerging rural businesses and helps fund distance learning networks and employment related adult education programs. Grants are in the amount of \$10,000 to \$50,000 (higher priority for smaller projects).

Sustainable Northwest: Forest-Based Sustainable Rural Development in the Dry Forest Zone. A **model** program to create multiple value streams that support sustainable forest stewardship by developing integrated woody biomass utilization and renewable energy infrastructure, building community, business, and organizational capacity to grow and replicate results, and influencing policy to create the conditions for success.

Principle: Natural Resource Conservation

King County (WA) Forestry Services -Technical Assistance Program. A **model** program that provides free assistance to forestland property owners and other interested individuals on growing a healthy forest, timber enhancement, improvement of wildlife habitat, and protection of water resources.

Sustainable Forestry Revolving Loan Fund. A **model** program that provides loans primarily for bridge financing to enable the expansion of small businesses. The financing mechanism has recently become a valuable tool for implementing environmental objectives like land conservation and non-point source pollution control. The interest and principal payments on old loans are used to issue new loans.

Principle: Focused Development

National Association of Realtors Community Preference Survey. The 2013 Community Preference Survey explores Americans' wants regarding neighborhood characteristics such as proximity to parks and shopping, walkability, and commuting time, and the trade-offs in home type and size that people may be willing to accept in order to obtain those neighborhood preferences.

Essential Smart Growth Fixes for Rural Planning, Zoning, and Development Codes, U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). The EPA has published a guide for local governments who want to implement critical changes to their code to allow and encourage smart growth development. It identifies the most common code and ordinance barriers and suggests implementation steps to overcome these barriers. It is organized around ten strategies that address key issues faced by rural communities. It emphasizes smart growth policy options that can be implemented by rural communities with limited resources.

Putting Smart Growth to Work in Rural Communities, Smart Growth Network. This publication focuses on how smart growth strategies can be applied in rural areas to guide growth, protect land and preserving the rural character of existing communities. These strategies are based around three goals: 1) create an economy that protects working lands and conserves natural lands; 2) help existing places to thrive by taking care of assets and investments such as downtowns, Main Streets and existing infrastructure; and 3) create great new places by building vibrant, enduring neighborhoods and communities.
